1. Welcome.

President Steve Lange opened the meeting and welcomed everyone. It was confirmed that a quorum was present. November 14, 2013 minutes were previously approved by email.

2. Convention Status Update.

2014 Annual Meeting

Update and Overall Schedule

Doug Morrison, Convention Chair, reported that the convention would be held at Gideon Putnam Resort in Saratoga Springs, NY, June 18 – 20. Plans for the convention are well underway. He is in the process of picking menus for the meals. The room rate will be \$305 per night for a single and \$210 per person per night for double occupancy. The rate includes lodging for one night, breakfast, lunch, dinner beginning on the day of arrival, as well as service charge and taxes.

Breaks will be in a hallway a little distance from the technical sessions which should help on noise around the technical session area. There will also be a table for registration by the break area. The hotel does have a shuttle to the hotel. Participants will need to contact the hotel to make a reservation for the shuttle.

Mr. Morrison reviewed the overall schedule. Box lunches will be furnished at the course. A cocktail reception and dinner are scheduled on the Gideon Patio, weather permitting, for Wednesday evening, June 18, at 7 pm.

The Annual Fun Run will be Thursday, June 19, from 5:30 to 6:30 pm followed by a reception from 7:15 to 8 pm at the Portico. The ALCA Award Banquet will be held at the Arches from 8 to 10 pm.

AV Coordinator

Doug Morrison, Convention Chair, has checked with Khorshed Alam to see if he was willing to be the Coordinator for the technical sessions. His company has approved him attending the convention and being the AV Coordinator for 2014 and possibly 2015.

Publicity

Mr. Peters reported that he has sent convention information as well as the history of the ALCA to several leather magazines. One has already done a piece on their online magazine. He will update the information as the technical program progresses.

2015 Convention Update:

Doug Morrison, 2015 Hotel Arrangements Chair and Convention Chair, reported that the 2015 site was picked by Council due to the attrition suffered at the 2013 Annual Convention. We will return to Pinehurst for the 2015, and they will allow one-half of the attrition to be credited to the convention. In addition a deposit of \$5,000 was also required. The deposit was paid last week. Therefore when we arrive at the convention in 2015, we should have a credit toward the convention of \$13,570.38. This will be very helpful for 2015 but might be a cash flow challenge in 2014.

The schedule for the 2015 convention will be similar to the 2013 one except the convention will be moved up one day, running from a Wednesday through Saturday, plus there will be a group lunch and dinner on the day of the golf tournament. The dates of the convention are June $9-12\ 2015$. The dates are earlier than usual, but they were the only dates available in June for 2015.

3. Financial Reports.

Council had previously been emailed the financial statements for 2013 and the Performance vs. 2013 Budget report. The reports showed a loss for the year 2013 of \$13,061 which was higher than the anticipated loss of \$9,952 reflected on the approved 2013 budget. Income in most areas was a little lower than anticipated including the profit from the 2013 convention. After review of all financials for 2013, it was felt that the

Association is in sound financial position. A financial analysis was performed on the 2013 books. The auditor's letter is attached to these minutes.

Motion was made and carried to accept the 2013 financial reports.

Executive Secretary Carol Adcock reviewed the Membership Report and Breakdown as of March 11. There are a total of 348 members at the present time including SLTC members participating in the Journal exchange.

Ms. Adcock also reported that final notices for dues and subscriptions have gone out. A list of unpaid dues was also reviewed. All will be dropped from the Association per the by-laws as of April 1. Mrs. Adcock reported that 6 advertisers committed for 2014 journal advertising, with an additional one being obtained in February. All are paid with the exception of the new one.

No written report had been submitted by Chair, Mainul Haque. However, Mrs. Adcock gave an oral report on the Leather Technology Correspondence Course administered by the committee. The committee has received several inquiries about the course which prompted an inventory of the books that accompany the course. She ordered 30 Leather Technicians Handbooks by Sharphouse and 32 Practical Leather Technology by Thorstensen. All have been received and paid for. She also had 20 sets of the course booklet printed. One new student has been received with more anticipated.

Environmental Affairs Committee - Mila Ramos, Chair

Received an update from, COTANCE, for whom we prepared then submitted a letter of support to their EU environmentally friendly initiative. They appreciated our support for their endeavor. They held a big meeting discussing their proposed initiatives late last year.

We had a successful teleconference meeting among the committee members last Nov 19. We were able to cover the planned agenda previously advised. Those present were: All USDA-ERRC members, Kim Dirks and Gary Rennerfeldt. We are opening our eyes and ears to new reports on impact of hides and leather industry and what people have done to remediate the problem.

The ASTM D31 committee will meet April 23 at the USDA's ERRC in Wyndmoor, PA. The D31 committee is working on

numerous projects, of which some include an Atomic Absorption method for total chrome of wet blue, currently being balloted at the subcommittee level. Also, being balloted are revisions to the Relative Stiffness of Leather by Means of a Torsional Wire Apparatus, revision and title change for Abrasion Resistance of Leather (Rotary Platform, Double-Head Method), and a new test method for the Resistance of Finish to Heat Aging (Finish Stability). We will be conducting a round robin for a HPLC method to determine the amount of fungicide (Diiodomethyl-p-tolylsulfone) in leather. If there are any labs interested in participating in this round robin, please contact Nick Latona.
