- Poverty is prevalent in America, with 12.9% of all women and 10.6% of all men living in poverty (povertyusa.org).
- 1 in 3 single mothers are living in poverty (Patrick, 2017).

- All participants are Hamilton County Residents
- All participants were at 200% of the Federal Guidelines of Poverty

- One of the questionnaires went missing so we only have data for 9 out of the 10 participants

METHODS

- Quantitative Data Analysis
 (QDA)
- VESTA The Virtual Electronic
 Service Tracking Assistant
- Barrier Questionnaires
- Arizona Self-Sufficiency Matrix
- Data was gathered from the participants during a selfsufficiency training to identify their barriers and their self-sufficiency scores using Arizona Self-Sufficiency Matrix
- Data was reviewed and entered into VESTA to create reports

CONCLUSIONS

- Most of the participants reported mental barriers just as high, or higher than their physical/institutional barriers to self-sufficiency.
- This overwhelming concern about self-esteem in the participants was not consistent with the research that I had done.
- There is a lack of solid research in finding how an individual's confidence level can impact their route from poverty to self-sufficiency, especially in single mothers.
